What Are Friends For? Chapter 16

In chapter 15, I identified five local industries that I have been able to 'rail fan' "open loads". These five included MGF Industries, Gunite Foundry, Liebovich Steel and Aluminum, Behr Iron & Metal, and Artzen Steel. As I mentioned, Artzen Steel <u>IS</u> moving. Unfortunately, of the remaining four, only two may still have some type of rail traffic.

I do know for sure that MGF Industries is long gone. It does, however, fit my "What Are Friends For? format because a friend of mine used to work there. There were three plants that I was able to visit because our friend Charlie Wickhorst worked there: Dorsey Trailer in Edgerton, WI., Swenson Spreader in Lindenwood, II., and MGF Technology in Rockford, II. Dorsey made semitrailers, Swenson makes those big orange highway salt spreaders, and MGF sized large rolls of wire for the manufacturing of fasteners. (Photo 1A & B) (Photos were taken at Charter Steel, Saukville, WI. during NMRA 2010 convention in Milwaukee, WI.) The majority of "wire" loads that I was able to photograph at MGF came in on what I would characterize as a dedicated car. (Photo 2) I tried to emulate the car by modifying an Athean 50' flat car. (Photo 3) We can go into that project at a later time. I did give Charlie one of the cars I modified that was lettered for my private road name. Charlie loaded it. (Photo 4) I have been able to catch similar loads in gondolas going through Rochelle. (Photo 5) The direction of the load on the car will determine how the car is unloaded when it gets to its destination. When the flatcars would come to MGF, the chain would be loosened and a forklift with a carpet-style boom could come in from the side and lift the coils off. Loads going the length of the car required a bit more work.

At this point, MGF is gone, Artzen Steel is still going. Gunite Foundry and Behr Scrap Metal are still there.....BUT.... both companies have been sold and changed names. The transfer of scrap from Behr on Seminary St. to the

foundry on Peoples Ave is also no more. I took a field trip in March to Peoples Ave and was fortunate to talk to an employee out in the parking lot who confirmed that there was no more rail traffic. Everything is brought in by truck.

Back in the day, Behr had some dedicated gondolas that would transfer scrap from Seminary St. over to the foundry. (**Photo 6,7,8**) When the Rock River Valley Division hosted the 1990 Midwest Region Spring Convention a set of decals was produced to letter a C.M.& G Furniture Car and a Jos. Behr & Sons Scrap Yard Gondola. (**Photo 9**) I wouldn't be surprised if there are some laying around yet in a few scrap boxes. (Including mine....found 'em)

A neighbor of mine worked at Behr *until* the new company took over. He had told me earlier that Behr had purchased a number of high-side gondolas. With a little photo recon, I was able to find "used" cars with the letters BIMX. (Behr Iron & Metal) (**Photo 10**) Remember what the "X" denotes, company owned car.

I haven't been rail fanning around Seminary St. in a while so I can't tell you if the cars have been re-lettered or not. If there is a cost involved, my guess is... N. O. T. Also, on a frugal note, I don't know the fate of the low side gondolas, but at least one or two are still useful without going out of the yard. (Photo 11 and 6)

I am not sure how "camera friendly" a lot of places are anymore. I have noticed a few more NO TRESPASSING" signs than I used to. I intend to share some of my collection of open load stuff at a later date. After all, what are friends for?

Oh, I also haven't talked about Liebovich Steel and Aluminum yet. WAFF, Gary


