I thought I was done with water towers in Chapter 24. WELL! Let me add just one more. (**Photo 1**) I can only tell you that I saw it is somewhere in Wisconsin on one of our stay-off- the-Interstate trips. Based on the size of the pipe down the center, I assume it is a water tank, not just a decoration or advertisement. This is also an example of those things that you see and need to snap a picture. Some other examples from my collection: **Photo 2-** Propane tank in Chippewa Falls, WI.; **Photo 3-**'Can of Chilli with Beans' along Interstate in Beloit, WI.; **Photo 4-**'Beer Bottles' in Manitowoc, WI.; **Photo 5-**"Beer Cans" in La Crosse, WI.

I have a brewery on my layout, but I do not need large beer cans to identify it. **(Photo 6)** The sign *Leinenkugel's* is a copy of a logo on a piece of stationary sent to me in response to a request I made to the brewery for some kind of

signage. If I remember right, they said they really didn't have much to send me. Okay.

I'll come back to *'Leinies'* in a later chapter. Right now I would like to get you thinking about details other water towers. I believe the subject in **Photo 7** is, or was somewhere in Rockford. My question is, "what in your scrap box can you use to replicate the large tank and smaller details to the side? (Think!)

While you're doing that......here's something else. I will assume that many of you have been to Rochelle, IL. for a time of train watching at the railroad park and The Diamonds. (If not, you have to go) WAFF

After the UP and /or BNSF provide you with photo ops, look around. Across the street to the east there is a small power plant. What it does exactly, I can't say but there is "train load" of details. **Photo 8** is taken from south of the BNSF tracks looking north. The large silver horizontal tanks could be modified commercial kits, or, a rather easy scratch built project. The two black vertical cylinders behind the horizontal tanks look a whole lot like the black magic markers I still have in the back of junk drawer in the kitchen.

(Photo 9) is a shot looking East from the street in front of the Rail Road park. This white or silver tank is somewhat larger that the black ones. It kind of looks like a jumbo marker. In both cases, I should remind you to leave the caps on them. (WAFF) Gary

Postscript: I know I said I was done with water tanks or towers.... but....in searching through more slides and photos, I came across a picture that I shot in Duluth,MN. during the 2016 SOO Line convention. 


